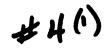

## SPECIAL MEETING OF THE PUTNAM COUNTY LEGISLATURE CALLED BY THE CLERK AT THE REQUEST OF THE CHAIRMAN TO BE HELD IN ROOM 318 PUTNAM COUNTY OFFICE BUILDING CARMEL, NEW YORK 10512

The meeting was called to order at 6:03 P.M. by Chairman Jonke who requested Legislator Castellano lead in the Pledge of Allegiance and Legislator Sayegh lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Addonizio, Nacerino, Ellner, Castellano, Sayegh and Chairman Jonke were present. Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman and Crowley were absent. Also present was Legislative Counsel Firriolo.

Item #4a – Reconsideration/ 2024 Budget Resolution #209 of 2023/ Board of Elections – Printing & Forms/ Vetoed by County Executive.

Chairman Jonke asked if there was a motion to move this forward.

There was no motion made to move this resolution forward to override the County Executive's veto.

RECONSIDERATION/ 2024 BUDGET RESOLUTION #209 OF 2023/ BOARD OF ELECTIONS – PRINTING & FORMS/ VETOED BY COUNTY EXECUTIVE

RESOLVED, that the County Executive's veto of Budget Resolution #209 of 2023 increasing the Board of Elections' Printing & Forms line #10145000 54311 from \$100,000 to \$150,000, after Legislative reconsideration, is hereby overridden.

Item #4b – Reconsideration/ 2024 Budget Resolution #213 of 2023/ Coroners 2.75% COLA Increase/ Vetoed by County Executive.

Chairman Jonke moved the following; seconded by Legislator Nacerino.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she wanted her comments to be entered into the record for all three (3) resolutions tonight pertaining to the Coroners, County Clerk and Sheriff. She stated that she was taken aback by the County Executive's vetoes for the Sheriff, County Clerk and Coroners which she believed was driven by politics. She believed that it was disingenuous and an insult to these elected officials. She stated that the County Executive stated in his three (3) identical veto messages, "I committed to the residents of Putnam County that, within my ability, I would not raise pay for elected officials. That is why the 2024 Tentative Budget had no merit increases or cost-of-living adjustments for the elected offices of County Executive, Sheriff, Clerk, District Attorney, or County Coroners." She stated that the County Executive secured a 3.5% COLA adjustment approved by the Legislature prior to taking office in 2023, totaling \$5,952, which was in the tentative budget. She believed that it was only right that he takes a freeze this year. She stated that by design he secured himself and then made a pledge not to give increases to other elected officials. She stated that he is the highest paid County

Executive in Putnam County history. She stated that the District Attorney's salary is dictated by New York State and the County Executive has no authority to set his salary. She stated that the County Executive states in his veto message, "This Administration recognizes the very real financial challenges many residents face as they struggle to support their families and navigate through sky-high inflation, record setting interest rates, and overall economic uncertainty. Due to many of these same challenges the cost of government has grown, and eliminating pay raises for elected officials demonstrates our awareness of that hardship and helps solidify the County's commitment to a fiscally sound budget." She believed that the County Executive was the one (1) growing government. She stated that his predecessor had a staff of three (3) for many years; herself, Chief of Staff, and secretary. She stated that there is now a staff of six (6). She stated that the County Executive vetoed the Legislature's amendment to restore COLA increases for these three (3) elected officials. She stated that the County Executive had no problem promising a \$24,000 increase for his Deputy County Executive at the beginning of this year, after securing the \$4,375 COLA increase. She stated that with the 2.75% COLA increase for 2024, the Deputy County Executive will receive another \$4,235 netting \$33,235 after being employed by the County for one (1) year. She stated the 2024 budget includes merit raises including additional 2.75% COLA increases. She stated that he gave his appointed County Attorney a \$2,950 merit increase in addition to a \$4,367 COLA increase totaling \$7,320. She stated that the County Executive's veto message also states, "it is unfair to include pay raises for elected officials while we are still actively negotiating contracts with various collective bargaining units." She stated that in accordance with the powers and duties of the County Executive referenced in the Putnam County Charter, Section 3.02(g) states: "make, sign, and implement all contracts on behalf of the County within authorized appropriations." She stated that there is no correlation between the cost-of-living increase and union contract negotiations. She stated that those non-elected employees who will be sitting at the negotiating table are the County Executive's appointed negotiation team who have received a cost-of-living increase. She believed that elected officials feel the inflation squeeze just like everyone else. She stated that the Sheriff, County Clerk, and Coroners are esteemed public servants. She stated that she was adamantly opposed and wholly disagreed with the County Executive's veto message.

Legislator Ellner stated that this was a difficult vote for him. He stated that he campaigned on no raises for elected officials. He stated that he came from the private sector and in his entire career never received a cost-of-living adjustment, so he never even factored that into the equation. He believed that it was wrong to isolate a few employees of the County. He stated that he understands that the County Executive is standing by his pledge, however he stated that he would have to break his and would be voting in favor of overriding the County Executive's veto.

Legislator Sayegh stated that while she appreciates the County Executive's commitment to fiscal discipline, she did not agree with the reasoning of the veto message. She stated that after her evaluation, she concluded that it had nothing to do with fiscal discipline. She stated that the first point of the County Executive's veto message recognizes, as pointed out by Legislator Nacerino, "the very real financial challenges many residents face as they struggle to support their families and navigate through sky-high inflation, record setting interest rates, and overall economic uncertainty." She stated that she agreed wholeheartedly. She stated that these were issues that all employees face including elected officials. She explained that elected officials were public servants hired by the people of Putnam County to carry out the business of the people. She

stated that each person being denied a cost-of-living adjustment, not a promotion or merit raise, lives in Putnam County. She explained that they do not commute from other areas, and they raise their families and pay their taxes here in Putnam County. She stated that they are subjected to the same financial challenges as all other employees. She stated that the next point in the veto messages states that the County Executive finds it, "unfair to include pay raises for elected officials while we are still actively negotiating contracts with various collective bargaining units." She questioned why we were tying the Coroners or County Clerk's salary into a union negotiation. She suggested doing the best we can for our employees and unions by negotiating a fair contract to begin with and not attaching any empty virtue signals to the negotiations. She found it "unfair" that these salaries would be tied to fair negotiations. She stated that we are talking about a total amount of \$11,405 for five (5) County employees. She stated that when the contracts are completed, those employees under the collective bargaining agreement will receive their full and fair compensations, while these five (5) employees will not. She stated that those in the Administration who will be involved in negotiating the contracts have all received, at least, the cost-of-living adjustment. She stated that some received merit raises over and above the COLA increase. She stated that the final point of the veto message she wanted to address was that according to the County Charter the County Executive does not set the pay of the Legislature and is therefore prevented from modifying Legislative salaries. She stated that even if the County Executive could set Legislative salaries, the total COLA adjustment for all nine (9) Legislators was \$11,905. Adding that to the five (5) other elected officials not getting a COLA adjustment would total \$23,366 for all 14 elected officials. She believed that the five (5) elected officials were not given COLA increases to make a political point. She stated that in the County Executive's first month of public office with the County, he provided a \$24,625 raise to his Deputy County Executive; an amount that exceeds all 14 elected official COLA adjustments combined. She stated that she voted against that increase. She stated that if he wanted to send a message to the collective bargaining units about fair negotiating, she believed that he should start with his own staff. She stated that she will be voting to override this veto. She believed that it was wrong to make an example of other people and their salaries to make a political point. She stated that each of these public servants were entitled to a cost-of-living adjustment, along with every other dedicated employee.

Legislator Addonizio stated that all managerial positions across the board in Putnam County received a modest 2.75% COLA increase. She stated that this is not a raise. She stated that a raise would be above and beyond the cost-of-living increase. She stated that in New York State, the Sheriff, County Clerk, and Coroners are required to be elected positions. She stated that these are the five (5) positions that the Administration believes should not be included in the cost-of-living increase. She questioned why they were being penalized for being in an elected position. She stated that she is totally against this veto and would be voting to override it this evening.

Legislator Castellano concurred with his colleagues. He stated that it was not a merit raise. It was a cost-of-living adjustment. He explained how inflation has affected everyone in the area. He explained that all the unions are currently under contract, except for one (1). He stated that he looked forward to the day where they could sit at the table and negotiate a contract as quickly as possible. He stated that the Sheriff, County Clerk, and Coroners are not part of those negotiations. He believed it was unfair that these five (5) individuals did not receive the COLA increase that was allowed for all management positions.

Legislator Ellner stated that he refused the 2.75% COLA increase for himself.

Chairman Jonke stated that he appreciated the fact that the County Executive submitted statements for the vetoes of the Legislature's budget changes. He believed it was a big mistake to make a campaign promise that limits the County Executive's ability to raise pay for elected officials. He explained that a cost-of-living adjustment keeps on pace with other position's salaries. He stated that we have seen that bigger problems can arise by not giving COLA raises to Department Heads. He stated that for the three (3) items we are going to discuss, we are talking about \$11,405. He stated that these salaries are in no way connected to the struggle and hardship families face that is mentioned in the veto message. He stated that the County Executive placed \$500,000 of discretionary funding in the budget for municipalities and special groups. He stated that was not recognizing "the very real financial challenges many residents face." He stated that a recent press release touted the reduction of the tax levy. He stated that it did not mention that it was the Legislature that took the \$500,000 out of the budget and gave it back to the taxpayers. He stated that the County Executive also stated that he finds it "unfair to include pay raises for elected officials while we are still actively negotiating contracts with various collective bargaining units." Chairman Jonke stated that he could not comprehend what the Sheriff, County Clerk and three (3) Coroners have to do with union negotiations. He questioned why the County Executive did not deny cost-of-living adjustments for all Department Heads. He stated that the Personnel Director, Commissioner of Finance, Deputy County Executive, and County Attorney all received a cost-of-living adjustment. He stated that the County Attorney also received a merit raise after being with the County for 10 months. He stated that these are the individuals that will be on the negotiating team. He believed it was not fair to single out the Sheriff. County Clerk and Coroners. He stated that the Coroners are on call 24/7, responding at all hours of the night at a salary of \$25,000 per year. He explained that without them, we would need a medical examiners office with a full-time physician which would increase our cost for that function by at least \$800,000. He stated that the County Clerk and Sheriff are Department Heads with great responsibility and have demonstrated their dedication to their jobs and this community. He stated that he would be voting to override this veto.

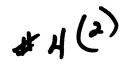

WHEREAS, employers are prohibited from discriminating against employees based on the employee's use of cannabis outside of the workplace, outside of work hours, and without use of the employer's equipment or property; and

WHEREAS, employers may prohibit use if required by law, if an employer will be in violation of Federal law, if a Federal contract will be lost, or if an employee is exhibiting articulable symptoms of impairment and it is affecting employee performance or safety; and

WHEREAS, outside of those limited exceptions, employers may not prohibit cannabis outside of the workplace, just as they cannot prohibit the use of alcohol or tobacco; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Drug and Alcohol Policy as currently written does not consider this legislative change; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the new policy does not exceed the allowances under the Labor Law; and be it further

### APPROVAL/ LITIGATION SETTLEMENT/ HAUGHEY V. COUNTY OF PUTNAM

WHEREAS, following the vacating of his felony conviction for arson in connection with a fire at a business in Carmel, New York, on or about September 21, 2018, Plaintiff William Haughey (Plaintiff) commenced action against, *inter alia*, the County of Putnam, The Town of Carmel, Carmel Fire District and various other named defendants in United States District Court, Southern District of New York alleging civil rights violations resulting in his wrongful imprisonment, including an alleged denial of a fair trial by fabrication of evidence in violation of his due process rights; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff sought recovery for financial damages in an undetermined amount as well as costs, disbursements, attorney's fees and interest; and

WHEREAS, the County's insurer, NYMIR, assigned the Portale Randazzo law firm, James A. Randazzo, Esq., to defend the County's interests in this matter which litigation has been handled by counsel since action was commenced in 2018; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff has proposed a settlement with the County subject to the County Attorney's endorsement and Legislature's approval, in which the County, along

with two other named defendants, the Town of Carmel, and Carmel Fire District, would pay Plaintiff the total sum of three million (\$3,000,000.00) dollars with a proposed breakdown of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000.00) or 20% to be paid by the Carmel Fire District. Of the remaining \$2,400,000.00, 60% of that amount or one million four hundred forty thousand dollars (\$1,440,000.00) is to be paid by the County and 40% of that amount or nine hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$960,000.00) is to be paid by the Town of Carmel; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney, the County's outside counsel, James A. Randazzo, Esq., and NYMIR's claims representative have now conditionally recommended the settlement as an alternative to trial and have determined what percentage of the proposed settlement will be paid by NYMIR on behalf of the County and Town of Carmel; and

WHEREAS, now that NYMIR has advised as to the respective amounts to be paid by each of the aforementioned defendants, the County Attorney and the County's outside counsel, have presented these updated figures to the Legislature and approve the proposed settlement as an alternative to trial so as to minimize the County's exposure and risk the potential for an exorbitant jury verdict; and

WHEREAS, the proposed settlement is in the public interest and would avoid the costs of further litigation, additional attorney's fees and costs and the risk of a high jury verdict; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the proposed settlement of this matter for the total sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000.00), of which the County is responsible for the sum of one million four hundred forty thousand dollars (\$1,440,000.00) is hereby approved; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is hereby authorized to sign any required settlement documents on behalf of the County including a Settlement Agreement and Release with respect thereto.

APPROVAL / REQUEST TO GOVERNOR HOCHUL TO SIGN A250A/S01466, AUTHORIZING PAYMENTS TO NONPARTICIPATING OR NONPREFERRED PROVIDERS OF AMBULANCE SERVICES LICENSED UNDER ARTICLE 30 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH LAW

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam recognizes that the constant and quick availability of ambulance response is something that all of our citizens have grown accustomed to, and it is essential to the survivability of all New Yorkers when there is a medical crisis; and

WHEREAS, in New York State, ambulance companies are mandated responders. As such, most ambulance providers have no knowledge of the patient's ability to pay, or if or by whom they are insured, when a medical emergency or accidental event occurs.

Ambulance service is one of the few medical services where payment is not expected at the time of service; and

WHEREAS, fair and direct reimbursement for those services is paramount to the financial stability and continued availability of ambulances to respond; and

WHEREAS, current law permits insurance companies to pay for ambulance service charges direct to the patient until and unless the ambulance company becomes a preferred provider of that specific insurance company; and

WHEREAS, it is not practical to expect ambulance services to have a preferred provider relationship with every insurance company, and it is the responsibility of the ambulance service to try to recoup payment for service from that patient; and

WHEREAS, all types of EMS providers routinely are not paid by the patient for ambulance services even though the patient receives payment from the insurance company. Especially as the financial crisis we are currently facing deepens, more and more patients are pocketing these funds; and

WHEREAS, the insurance company is not obligated to advise the ambulance company that they in fact paid the ambulance transport bill direct to the patient. This disconnect of information leads to confusion and furthers the lack of proper payment issue; and

WHEREAS, in June 2023, the New York State Legislature passed bills A250A and S01466, which are designed to assure that responding ambulance services will receive direct payment for all ambulance service transports upon submission of an invoice to the insurance company without the need for the responding ambulance company to be a preferred provider; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature and the Putnam County Executive respectfully call upon Governor Hochul to sign A250A/S01466 to help our invaluable ambulance services receive the fair and direct reimbursement for their services from insurance companies to which they are entitled without having to become a preferred provider; and be it further

RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to Governor Hochul and to Putnam County's representatives in the New York State Senate and Assembly.

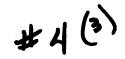

Item #4a - Approval/ Litigation Settlement Agreement / Matthew Rivera v. County of Putnam was next. Chairman Jonke recognized Legislator Addonizio, Chairwoman of the Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee. On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Ellner and Gouldman, Legislator Addonizio moved the following:

**RESOLUTION #268** 

APPROVAL/ LITIGATION SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT / MATTHEW RIVERA V. COUNTY OF PUTNAM

WHEREAS, on or about June 29, 2020, at approximately 2:00 a.m., Plaintiff Matthew Rivera, was walking on the Maybrook Trailways at or near where it crosses the East Bank of the Croton River in Brewster, New York, when he tripped and fell from the train trestle he was walking on to the ground far below sustaining severe injuries: and

WHEREAS, on or about September 16, 2020 Plaintiff Matthew Rivera commenced action against the County of Putnam, Metro North Commuter Railroad and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority in Supreme Court, Putnam County alleging that his injuries were caused, *inter alia*, by the defendants' failure to properly secure the train track and trestle, inadequate lighting in the area, and improperly maintained fence whereby Plaintiff obtained access to the train tracks and trestle; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff sought recovery for compensatory damages in an undetermined amount as well as costs, disbursements, attorney's fees and interest; and

WHEREAS, the Claims Committee for the New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal (NYMIR) recently arrived at a settlement value for this case of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff agreed to a settlement with the County, subject to the Legislature's approval, in which the County agreed to pay Plaintiff the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney, the County's outside counsel, James A. Randazzo, Esq., and NYMIR's claims representative have recommended the settlement as an alternative to trial; and

WHEREAS, counsel for the County of Putnam has in fact settled the matter with Plaintiff for the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars, and Plaintiff has executed the required General Release which, upon approval by the Legislature will be filed with the Court, thereby discontinuing this matter and allowing Plaintiff to receive his settlement payment in the agreed upon amount; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned settlement is in the public interest and avoids the costs of further litigation, additional attorney's fees and costs and the risk of a high jury verdict; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the proposed settlement of this matter for the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars is hereby approved; and

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is hereby authorized to sign any required settlement documents on behalf of the County including a Settlement Agreement and Release with respect thereto.

Item #4e - Approval/ Local Law Establishing the 2024 Salary of Certain Elected Officials Serving for Fixed Terms was next. On behalf of the members of the Personnel Committee, Legislators Castellano and Nacerino, Chairman Jonke moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery stated that she was not in favor of this as referenced in her comments during the budget process. She stated that this includes all elected officials including the Legislature. She stated that she did not believe that the Chair of the Legislature should receive a stipend. She stated that Dutchess County Legislators went from \$16,000 to \$27,000 this year and they are three (3) times the size of Putnam County. She stated that they do not give a stipend to the Chairperson, however the party leaders receive a stipend, which in that case she would receive a stipend. She believed that we were way off scale compared to other counties.

Legislator Ellner stated that he refused the raise, however that was not reflected in the amount listed on the resolution.

Chairman Jonke stated that was correct, however the amount was budgeted.

Legislator Crowley explained that she understands that the salary amount is budgeted, however, for the record she stated that she too submitted a letter that she would not be accepting the raise.

Legislator Montgomery stated that while she is not in favor of this, she was inclined to not handing the raise over to Putnam County to mismanage. She stated that she would take care of that herself and put the raise where she thinks it should go.

Item #4f - Approval/ Local Law Establishing the 2024 Salaries of Certain Appointed Officers Serving for Fixed Terms was next. On behalf of the members of the Personnel Committee, Legislators Castellano and Nacerino, Chairman Jonke moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery explained that there was a discussion regarding the decrease in the Commissioner of Social Services' salary. She stated that the justification was that she is new to this position and the previous person in the position was there many years. She stated that the justification for giving raises to the Sheriff's command staff was that we needed to raise them to the level of the position before they were employees of Putnam County. She did not understand why the new Commissioner of Social Services salary was decreased from the allocated budget of the previous Commissioner's salary. She questioned if it was because she was a woman. She believed the salary should be fair across the board.

Legislator Ellner believed that the agreed upon salary was contractual between the individual and the County.

Chairman Jonke stated that the salary was negotiated within a salary range for the position. She accepted this salary, and she did not have the experience or number of years in the position as her predecessor. He stated that this is not something unusual. He stated that to compare it to what happened in the Sheriff's Department when we had Captains that took a decrease in pay for one (1) year and then we corrected it was misleading.

Legislator Montgomery made a motion to revise this resolution by eliminating the word "all" officers in two (2) places and to remove elected officials from the resolution, placing them on a proposed separate resolution.

There was no second on the motion.

Legislator Montgomery clarified that we are voting on raises for elected officials included with all County employees in this resolution. She stated that year after year she has asked that the elected officials be separated from this resolution. She explained that if we do not agree elected officials should get a raise, then we are forced to vote against this resolution which includes raises for management.

Chairman Jonke stated that there was no second on the motion. He stated that seeing no further discussion on the pre-filed resolution, he called for a Roll Call Vote.

She stated that the County has left hundreds of thousands of dollars on the table since 2019 from the Climate Smart Program. She explained that it was unfortunate that her proposed policy, which mirrored every policy across the State, was not previously adopted. She was glad that we are now adopting a policy and that we will finally be able to access the rewards of this Climate Smart Program. She believed it would make our streets safer.

Legislator Addonizio stated that this is not a requirement. She stated that the program was passed in 2011 requiring that complete streets design guidelines be considered for the planning, design, construction, and reconstruction of roadways that are receiving federal or state funding. She clarified that it was not a requirement, it was a consideration.

WHEREAS, Putnam County has and will continue to follow the NYSDOT <u>Capital Projects Complete Streets Checklist</u> and NYSDOT's <u>Smart Growth Screening Tool</u> for federally and state funded projects respectively; and

WHEREAS, the Complete Streets Policy encourages incorporating Complete Streets design practices, to the extent feasible, as a part of infrastructure planning, design, and maintenance for County projects; and

WHEREAS, an important component to the success of Complete Streets in Putnam County is ensuring that all county services and facilities are accessible as required by Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990; NOW THEREFORE BE IT

## ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING OF THE PUTNAM COUNTY LEGISLATURE HELD IN THE HISTORIC COURTHOUSE CARMEL, NEW YORK 10512

Tuesday

January 2, 2024

7:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by County Clerk Michael Bartolotti who requested Legislator Crowley to lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. County Clerk Bartolotti then requested Legislator Sayegh to lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Addonizio, Ellner, Jonke, Castellano, Sayegh and Crowley were present. Legislator Nacerino was absent. Also present was Legislative Counsel Firriolo.

Item #4 – Appointment/Chair/Putnam County Legislature was called first. County Clerk Bartolotti requested nominations from the floor for Chair of the Legislature.

Legislator Castellano made a motion to nominate Legislator Jonke as Chairman; seconded by Legislator Addonizio.

Legislator Castellano stated that Legislator Jonke was elected to office in 2016 as Putnam County Legislator for District #6. He served as Chairman of the Legislature in 2023 and served as Chairman of the Protective Services and Personnel Committees. He stated that he has over 30 years in public service. He has managed municipal budgets on a local level in the towns of Carmel, Southeast and Kent as the Assessor. He stated that he was responsible for the Town of Southeast adopting the homestead option which ensures that residential tax rates are lower than commercial rates. He stated that Legislator Jonke has a great deal of knowledge, not only in government, but in the business community. He is a devoted father and advocate for the Special Needs community.

Legislator Addonizio stated that she was honored to second the nomination. She stated that Legislator Jonke is serving his third term as Legislator representing the Town of Southeast. She stated that Legislator Jonke is a conscientious and dedicated public servant and is willing to serve as Chairman of the Legislature for a second year.

County Clerk Bartolotti asked if there were any other nominations.

County Clerk Bartolotti stated that seeing no further nominations, he asked for a roll call vote on the nomination.

Legislator Montgomery requested discussion on the nomination. She stated her concern this year, as she witnessed incidents in the County such as storms, racial incidents, and school uprisings. She stated that shootings and bomb threats are rampant throughout the Country. She understands that Legislator Jonke was on the Protective Services Committee and would like to know what National Incident Management System (NIMS) training he has. She stated that we are required, or it is recommended that Elected Officials have NIMS training. She stated that she has different levels of training for incident management. She stated that the County has a Bureau of Emergency Services

and a Sheriff's Department, but she has a great concern if we are prepared for these incidents. She stated that our residents look to their Elected Officials for guidance and answers during times of these types of incidents. She questioned what type of incident management training our proposed Chairman has.

Legislator Jonke stated that he was not aware of a prerequisite. He stated that we have professional people that work for the County who handle our incidents, not the Chairman of the Legislature.

County Clerk Bartolotti asked for a roll call vote on the nomination.

Chairman Jonke thanked his colleagues who supported him. He stated that it has been an honor serving as Chairman for the last year. He stated that we have done some incredibly good things. He stated that for the first time in 30 years we reduced the tax levy giving our taxpayers back their money. He stated that we are now offering exemptions for our first responders. He stated that he will continue to work diligently as Chairman this year.

Item #5 – Appointment/Deputy Chair/Putnam County Legislature was next.

Chairman Jonke made a motion to nominate Legislator Sayegh to serve as Deputy Chair; seconded by Legislator Castellano.

Chairman Jonke stated that Legislator Sayegh has done a superb job as Deputy Chair in 2023 and is deserving of this position for another year. He stated that Legislator Sayegh is steadfast and calm and always does her best for the people of Putnam County. He stated that Legislator Sayegh uses her heart, head, and spine to serve our residents. He stated that for six (6) years she has always been well prepared for the work that we do and does it in a respectful, professional, and compassionate manner.

Legislator Castellano stated that it was his honor to second the nomination. He stated that he knows Legislator Sayegh for approximately 10 years. He stated that she is a dedicated public officer and a great advocate for her community. He explained that a community newspaper keeps the towns and individuals of the community informed on meetings, high school sports and events specific to each town and community. They keep residents informed on the critical issues of each local community. He believed that was not occurring with the Putnam County Press. He explained that the Putnam County News & Recorder which he is requesting be added to the resolution covers the western side of the County, Putnam Valley and Philipstown. He stated that they also serve every school district. He asked his colleagues to support this paper as an additional resource.

Seconded by Legislator Addonizio.

Chairman Jonke questioned if there was discussion on the motion to amend.

Legislator Montgomery stated that last year the Putnam County News & Recorder and the Putnam County Courier appeared on the agenda as was the practice in past years if a request was submitted. She explained that she opposed both papers last year because their primary reporter was appointed to a County Board and was also the public information officer for the Bureau of Emergency Services. She believed it was unethical. She stated that this year she would support this amendment because the reporter is no longer appointed to a County Board or the public information officer for the Bureau of Emergency Services. She stated that it has nothing to do with her opinion of any paper.

She stated that they are not always so friendly towards her and she has been dealing with that even before she was in office.

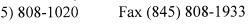

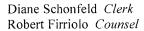

Commissioner Lewis,

As you are aware, I have handed in my retirement papers, and my last day as Tourism Director is 12/31/23. After conversations with the County Executive and Personnel Director, I am very interested and would look forward to continuing working for the County in Tourism on a part-time basis.

I am requesting the following budgetary amendments to the 2024 Tourism Budget:

- Adjusting the I Love NY Budgetary Line down \$16,522 from \$120,000 to the correct amount of \$103,478. I am requesting this change because I Love NY awarded only \$51,739 and not the \$60k that was requested. I am further requesting that the County portion of the \$16,522 (\$8,261) be moved to the Temporary line (51094).
- Adjusting the Tourism Director salary line from \$89,167 to \$85,000 and moving \$4,000 to the Temporary Line (51094).
- Moving \$4,739 from the Misc. line to the Temporary line (51094).

These adjustments will increase the Temporary Line from \$15,510 to \$32,510 and create the opportunity for me to stay on in a part-time capacity (at \$22,000 per year) as an assistant and resource to the new Tourism Director. The remaining \$10,500 in the Temporary Line would be used to fund an administrative assistant position. These budgetary amendments would create no change to the 2024 Tourism Budget and would be at no additional cost to the taxpayers.

I am proud to say that according to the most recent report from Tourism Economics, Putnam County Tourism generated \$78M from traveler spending. This represents year over year growth of \$16.9M which is an increase of 24.8%.

Putnam County Tourism is an advocate and champion for Putnam County. It is a revenue generator and an investment in the county which benefits every one of its residents.

I respectfully request that these amendments be approved so that I may continue to be a part of this small but important team.

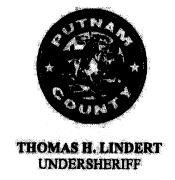

**RESOLVED,** the Putnam County Legislature hereby approves and ratifies the Memorandum of Agreement, dated December 15, 2023, which was entered into with Putnam Management Association for the period of January 1, 2024 through and including December 31, 2027; and

#### MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

#### By and Between the

#### County of Putnam

#### and the

#### Putnam Management Association

The January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2023 Collective Bargaining Agreement by and between the parties is hereby modified as follows. All other provisions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged except the modification of dates and other housekeeping modifications where applicable. This Memorandum of Agreement shall be subject to approval/ratification by the Putnam County Legislature and the membership of the Union. Members of the respective negotiating teams affirm that they shall support the approval/ratification of this Memorandum of Agreement by their respective bodies.

- 1. Term of Agreement: January 1, 2024 December 31, 2027.
- 2. Article IV, Compensation, Section F, Salary.

Effective January 1, 2024, each member's salary shall be increased by 2.75%.

Effective January 1, 2025, each member's salary shall be increased by 2.50%.

Effective January 1, 2026, each member's salary shall be increased by 2.50%.

Effective January 1, 2027, each member's salary shall be increased by 2.50%.

#### 3. Article IV, New Provisions.

Effective January 1, 2024, employees shall receive a yearly retention bonus as follows:

After 10 years of service to the county: \$1,000

After 15 years of service to the county: \$1,500 (\$500 increase)

After 20 years of service to the county: \$2,000 (\$500 increase)

After 25 years of service to the county: \$2,500 (\$500 increase)

These payments will not be added to base salary and will not be cumulative.

#### 12/14/2023

These payments will be made in a separate check to be paid on the first payroll date of January of each year. Any employee who has completed the respective years of service by December 31<sup>st</sup> of each year will be eligible for the payment in the following January.

#### 4. Article IV, Compensation, Section K, Direct Deposit.

Delete "as requested"

Add provision to provide that employees shall receive their W-2 and 1095-c forms electronically.

#### 5. Article V, Safety and Health.

ADD a new Section B to read as follows and re-letter current Sections:

#### Section B - Motor Vehicle Summonses

Effective September 2, 1997, any County employee who, as a regular part of his/her employment, drives a vehicle for County business must notify his/her Department Head, by the next business day, of any and all moving motor vehicle summonses whether due to driving on or off duty. All County employees, to whom the above paragraph applies, must notify the County of all DWI summonses immediately.

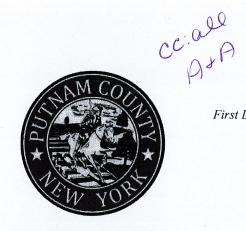

At this time \$240,000 is needed and can be taken from the Preschool itinerant budget. In 2023, more children were attending center-based programs and less children were receiving home services. This will have no fiscal impact on the County.

#### **EARLY INTERVENTION:**

Early Intervention the budget for itinerant services is also short \$88,000 for the 2023 year. In 2023, we averaged 200 children in the program. As we evaluated these children most are demonstrating delays in three areas of development. (Cognitive, Communication, and Social Emotional) The needs of these children and the severity of delays are more intense. This level need leads to increases in services to assist the families and help the children meet their potential. We are requesting to move monies from Early Intervention evaluations, center-based, and assistive technology to cover the deficit of Early Intervention itinerant services. This will have no impact on the County.

## APPROVAL/ LITIGATION SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT / MATTHEW RIVERA V. COUNTY OF **PUTNAM**

WHEREAS, on or about June 29, 2020, at approximately 2:00 a.m., Plaintiff Matthew Rivera. was walking on the Maybrook Trailways at or near where it crosses the East Bank of the Croton River in Brewster, New York, when he tripped and fell from the train trestle he was walking on to the ground far below sustaining severe injuries; and

WHEREAS, on or about September 16, 2020 Plaintiff Matthew Rivera commenced action against the County of Putnam, Metro North Commuter Railroad and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority in Supreme Court, Putnam County alleging that his injuries were caused, inter alia, by the defendants' failure to properly secure the train track and trestle, inadequate lighting in the area, and improperly maintained fence whereby Plaintiff obtained access to the train tracks and trestle; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff sought recovery for compensatory damages in an undetermined

amount as well as costs, disbursements, attorney's fees and interest; and

WHEREAS, the Claims Committee for the New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal (NYMIR) recently arrived at a settlement value for this case of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars: and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff agreed to a settlement with the County, subject to the Legislature's approval, in which the County agreed to pay Plaintiff the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney, the County's outside counsel, James A. Randazzo, Esq., and NYMIR's claims representative have recommended the settlement as an alternative to trial; and

WHEREAS, counsel for the County of Putnam has in fact settled the matter with Plaintiff for the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand (\$250,000,00) dollars, and Plaintiff has executed the required General Release which, upon approval by the Legislature will be filed with the Court, thereby discontinuing this matter and allowing Plaintiff to receive his settlement payment in the agreed upon amount; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned settlement is in the public interest and avoids the costs of further litigation, additional attorney's fees and costs and the risk of a high jury verdict: now therefore be it

## I. Purpose

The purpose of this Local Commissioners Memorandum (LCM) is to advise municipal youth bureaus on the availability of Youth Development Program (YDP), Runaway and Homeless Youth (RHY), and Youth Sports and Education Opportunity Funding (YSEF) allocations for program year October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024.

## II. Background

The New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) issues YDP, RHY, and YSEF allocations to municipal youth bureaus. Each youth bureau must submit a Resource Allocation Plan (RAP) to OCFS that indicates how these funds will be utilized. Counties are also required to submit an annual Child and Family Services Plan (CFSP) and/or a CFSP update to OCFS. Among other topics, these plans articulate how the county will administer and support RHY and youth development programming. Programs and services must be included in the appropriate section(s) of a county's CFSP to be eligible for YDP or RHY state aid.

Additional details about completing the CFSP can be found in <u>23-OCFS-LCM-06</u>, <u>Guidelines and Instructions for Preparing the Child and Family Services Annual Plan Update</u>, and in the resource documents embedded within the CFSP portal. The CFSP portal can be accessed at <a href="https://countyplans.ocfs.ny.gov/log-in/">https://countyplans.ocfs.ny.gov/log-in/</a>.

In rare instances, a county may identify mid-year that they have been allocated YDP, RHY, and/or YSEF funds that they cannot spend or claim. When this occurs, counties are encouraged to contact OCFS as soon as possible. Sharing this information with OCFS may allow those unused funds to be moved to another county with similar programming and demonstrated fiscal need. Counties demonstrate fiscal need – and therefore may become eligible to receive additional funds should they become available – by accurately completing the RAP.

#### **YDP**

Eligible expenses and claiming processes remain unchanged from previous years. Additional details about the RAP submission and approval process can be found in guidance documents on the home page of the Quality Youth Development System (QYDS) at <a href="https://hs.ocfs.ny.gov/qyds/">https://hs.ocfs.ny.gov/qyds/</a>. State share is available for 100% of eligible expenditures as included in the approved RAP. Claims are due September 30, 2025.

The allocations are distributed using each county's allocation percentage compared to the total funds, as determined in the calendar year 2016 Spending Plan. OCFS expects to review this methodology in upcoming program years.

#### RHY

Eligible expenses and claiming processes remain unchanged from previous years with the following exception: effective program year 2023-2024, a county may use up to **10**% of its RHY allocation to support the salary of the municipal RHY service coordinator, with limited exceptions. The remaining 90% must go toward RHY programming.

An exception may be made when the only RHY service in a county is non-residential programming provided directly by the RHY service coordinator. In this instance, the work of the coordinator is both administrative and programmatic, thus the 10% cap does not apply.

A total of \$4,984,000 is allocated in accordance with each county's proportion of OCFS-certified beds. The additional allocation of \$2.1 million is distributed based on each county's proportion of Transitional Independent Living Support Program beds. Counties that only offer non-residential services are capped at \$15,000. State share is available for 60% of eligible expenditures as included in the approved RAP. Claims are due 12 months after the calendar quarter in which services were delivered.

Additional information can be found in the 2024 RHY claiming guide.

#### **YSEF**

YSEF awards are guided by the following principles:

- Sports are effective tools in positive youth development and family engagement.
- Sports improve the lives of young people by promoting positive social, emotional, health, and educational outcomes and have important life-long effects.
- Sports enable opportunities for young people to thrive through leadership roles.
- Coaching education greatly improves young people's sports experience and development outcomes.

Funded programs must provide a variety of sports for a broad range of youth in under-resourced communities. OCFS encourages a wide and flexible definition of sports that encompasses any organized activities with movement, including physical fitness activities such as yoga, hiking, dance, and active outdoor pursuits.

To ensure that funding is going to the intended population, municipal youth bureaus must distribute funds based on local need,<sup>1</sup> considering factors including, but not limited to the following:

- historically under-resourced communities;
- · public housing;
- high rates of family homelessness;
- Opportunity Zones or neighborhoods/cities/areas deemed "low-income" via externally available tools like the New York State Council on Children and Families Kids' Well-being Indicators Clearinghouse;
- marginalized communities or groups with higher barriers to participation in sports (e.g., youth with disabilities; girls; transgender/gender non-binary youth; and youth who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, or questioning);
- federally and/or New York State-recognized tribes and tribal organizations; and
- neighborhoods that experience higher rates of crime and violence and have lower-performing schools.

Additionally, municipal youth bureaus should give priority consideration to programs that serve youth identifying as Black, indigenous, or people of color, as well as to providers of adaptive sports for youth with physical disabilities.

All funded programs must aim to foster the following:

- Educational connection and achievement More youth attending and completing school with increased attainment, including collegiate placement success
- Physical health and well-being Increasing physical activity and positive relationships to one's body and physical activity
- Mental health and well-being Improving outcomes related to youth's mental health and social and emotional skills development and connectedness
- Employment Increasing qualifications and skills, such as collective problem-solving, teamwork, and dispute resolution, which help prepare youth for suitable employment
- Community cohesion Breaking down barriers to reduce discrimination, crime, and violence in communities and help young leaders emerge

## Eligibility and Funding

Municipal youth bureaus will contract with local organizations, municipalities, and/or local or municipal youth bureaus directly for up to \$50,000 per program. Organizations that serve multiple areas through different programs may be funded above \$50,000. Funding may provide general operating dollars to give programs flexibility to efficiently allocate resources for quality programming. Line-item budgets should focus on programming costs, including, but not limited to, the following:

- Coaches/instructors/direct service staff/mentors (including training/professional development)
- Equipment
- Educational programming costs
- Facility/field space cost
- A maximum of 15% of program funds may be used to support administrative/overhead costs

Programs eligible for funding must meet the criteria below:

- Provide structured sports activities for youth ages 6-17
- Serve youth in New York State
- Demonstrate basic competency in the areas of governance, monitoring and evaluation, partnership, and financial stewardship
- Have a child protection policy in place that includes adherence to local city, agency, school district, and state child protection guidelines
- Collect registration data, including participant demographic information, as required by OCFS in a manner that allows for accurate reporting of anonymized aggregate data

Organizations and activities <u>not</u> eligible for funding are the following:

- For-profit organizations or businesses
- Private foundations, as defined in section 509(a) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code
- Organizations that discriminate based on age, ethnicity/race, political affiliation, religion, sexual
  orientation, gender, gender identity, physical or other disability, national origin, or any protected
  characteristic under local, state, and/or federal law
- Research or project-planning activities
- Support for elite or private sports camps, programs, or teams
- Endowments, memorials, budget deficits, or fundraising activities
- Religious organizations whose sports programs do not have a secular and community focus
- Lobbying, political, or fraternal activities
- Capital projects

<u>Touchstone Life Areas and Services, Opportunities and Supports (SOS) in the Quality Youth Development System (QYDS)</u>

Municipal youth bureaus will be required to report demographics and outcomes through QYDS. The Life Area and SOS selections that will be required in QYDS for YSEF are as follows:

- Performance measures:
  - How Much: 0232A.1 Number of youth participating (unduplicated)
  - How Well: 0232B.4 Percent of youth completing the program
  - Better Off: 0232C.1 Number and percent reporting they have improved their ability to socialize/interact with peers/family/other members of the community

Allocations are established based on census data in each county, with a minimum allocation of \$10,000 to each county.

In program year 2023-2024, municipal youth bureaus will receive an additional allocation of \$10,344 with the exception of New York City (NYC), which will receive \$10,392. These funds were appropriated based on online gambling revenue and divided evenly among the state's 58 social services districts, with the rounding difference going to NYC. Eligible expenses include one-time investments in infrastructure for physical activity. Examples include improvements to sport fields or courts, building a storage unit to maintain equipment, the purchase of sporting equipment or uniforms, or similar costs. State share is available for 100% of eligible expenditures as included in the approved RAP. Eligible expenses and claiming processes remain unchanged from the previous year. Claims are due September 30, 2025.

### I. Purpose

The purpose of this Local Commissioners Memorandum (LCM) is to inform local departments of social services (LDSSs) about funding for the Safe Harbour: NY Program for program year January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2024.

## II. Background

Safe Harbour: NY program funds are intended to support **all** youth identified as trafficked, sexually exploited, or being at risk up to the age of 21. A youth's eligibility for services or support funded through Safe Harbour: NY is not contingent on any demographic factors or other personal characteristics such as immigration status, the source of the referral, or the youth's involvement in child welfare or juvenile justice system(s).

Each LDSS is required to submit to the New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) planning documents including the Sexually Exploited and Trafficked Youth section in the CFSP, the Safe Harbour: NY Program Plan, and the Safe Harbour NY Program Budget. The Safe Harbour: NY plan and budget must be submitted to OCFS using the templates provided. Plans are informed by an assessment of local need as well as guidance provided by OCFS, including but not limited to the <u>Blueprint for Building a Child Welfare Response to Commercially Sexually Exploited and Trafficked Youth (Blueprint)</u>. The Blueprint, and many other resources, can be found on the OCFS website at <a href="https://ocfs.ny.gov/programs/human-trafficking/">https://ocfs.ny.gov/programs/human-trafficking/</a>.

Additional details about completing the CFSP can be found in 21-OCFS-LCM-06, Guidelines and Instructions for Preparing the Child and Family Services Annual Plan Update, and within resource documents embedded within the CFSP portal. The CFSP portal can be accessed at <a href="https://countyplans.ocfs.ny.gov/log-in/">https://countyplans.ocfs.ny.gov/log-in/</a>.

### III. Program Implications

Each LDSS is required to submit to OCFS the following planning documents: Appendix D: Safe Harbour: NY 2023 Report and 2024 Plan Template, and Appendix E: Safe Harbour: NY 2024 Budget Template. These documents are to be submitted to the county's OCFS Safe Harbour program lead by **December 29, 2023**. If the LDSS does not know who their program lead is, an inquiry can be made to humantrafficking@ocfs.ny.gov.

Allocations are issued as preliminary. OCFS retains the ability to evaluate programming and spending throughout the program year. Underspent or unclaimed funds are subject to redistribution to other LDSSs based on demonstrated need.

All Safe Harbour funds from the 2024 program year must be expended by January 31, 2025, and all claims must be submitted and approved by the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) by March 31, 2025. These deadlines are firm; any unspent funds will be lost and may impact future funding.

# IV. Claiming

Safe Harbour expenditures must be separately identified and claimed through the RF-17 claim package for special project claiming. The costs must be first identified on the RF-2A claim package as F17 functional costs and reported in the F17 column on the *Cost Allocation Schedule of Payments Administrative Expenses Other Than Salaries* (LDSS-923) and the Schedule D, *DSS Administrative Expenses Allocation and Distribution by Function and Program* (LDSS-2347). After final acceptance of the RF-2A claim package, the individual project costs are then reported under the project label "Safe Harbor 2024" on the RF-17 Worksheet, *Distribution of Allocated Costs to Other Reimbursable Programs* (LDSS-4975A).

Salaries, fringe benefits, staff counts, and central services costs must be directly entered on the RF-17 Worksheet, *Distribution of Allocated Costs to Other Reimbursable Programs* (LDSS-4975A), while overhead costs are automatically brought over from the RF-2A, Schedule D, and distributed based upon the proportion of the number of staff assigned to this project. Employees not working all their time on this project must maintain time studies to support the salary and fringe benefit costs allocated to the program.

Non-salary administrative costs must be reported with the appropriate object of expense(s) on the Summary-Administrative (page 1), Schedule of Payments for Expenses Other Than Salaries for Other Reimbursable Programs (LDSS-923-B).

Program costs must be reported as object of expense 37 - Special Project Program Expense on the Summary - Program (page 2), Schedule of Payments for Expenses Other Than Salaries for Other Reimbursable Programs (LDSS-923-B).

Total project costs, including all costs regardless of state reimbursement, must be reported on the LDSS-4975, *Monthly Statement of Special Project Claims Federal and State Aid (RF-17)*, as 100% state share excluding central services costs, which are local share. Local districts will be reimbursed up to their approved allocation.

To receive reimbursement, claims for eligible "Safe Harbor 2024" expenditures for the period January 1, 2024, through January 31, 2025, must be final accepted in the Automated Claiming System (ACS) by March 31, 2025.

Further instructions for completing time studies, the LDSS-923 and Schedule D, and the RF-17 claim package can be found in Chapters 4, 7, and 18, respectively, of the *Fiscal Reference Manual* (FRM), Volume 3. # Appendix B:

Safe Harbour: NY Allowable Use of Funds, 2024

## **Target Population:**

Services for sexually exploited children created in each target county pursuant to the Safe Harbour for Exploited Children Act are to be made available to *all* children who have been commercially sexually exploited (CSEC). This is inclusive of all youth, irrespective of gender identity or sexual orientation, up to age 21. Youth are eligible for Safe Harbour: NY funded supports whether they are identified voluntarily; as a condition of an adjournment in contemplation of dismissal issued in criminal court or through procedures or diversion services associated with the Family Court Act (diversion services, child welfare, juvenile delinquency, etc.); or a referral from a local social services agency.<sup>1</sup>

### Fiscal Requirements:

- The program year is January 1 December 31, 2024. All Safe Harbour funds must be expended by January 31, 2025, and all claims must be approved by the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance by March 31, 2025. These deadlines are firm; unspent funds will be lost and may impact future funding.
- Claims must be in alignment with the OCFS-approved program plan and budget.
- Allocations are issued as preliminary. OCFS retains the ability to evaluate programming and spending throughout the program year. Underspent and unclaimed funds are subject to redistribution to other counties based on demonstrated need.

## Allowable Expenses:

Counties receiving Safe Harbour: NY funds are charged with developing a service system to meet the needs of these youth. Allowable expenses to support this effort include but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Hiring a Safe Harbour coordinator who will provide leadership in developing and implementing program goals and objectives. (Fringe benefits are capped at 30% unless the coordinator is a local department of social services [LDSS] employee).
- 2. Providing case assessment and referral services through a multidisciplinary team approach, including the utilization of Child Advocacy Centers/Multidisciplinary Teams, to interview youth and develop case plans to meet their needs.
- Supporting the salary of per diem and other staff at community agencies that meet the needs of CSEC and at-risk youth, including staff of Runaway and Homeless Youth programs.
- **4.** Creating or further developing a critical team to address the issue of the sexual exploitation of children on a community-wide basis.
- 5. Providing intensive case planning to meet the needs of sexually exploited youth, including but not limited to food, clothing, age-appropriate leadership development and recreational opportunities, transportation, purchase of items to meet emergency needs, disposable cell phones, etc.

- **6.** Providing safe long- and short-term housing, including the use of respite or runaway and homeless youth beds where appropriate.
- 7. Developing and promoting community awareness campaigns about the sexual exploitation and trafficking of youth, including information on the identification and referral to services through community events or other methods of disseminating information (such materials must be approved by OCFS before they are published).
- 8. Maintenance of a county website regarding sexually exploited youth and/or Safe Harbour.
- **9.** Providing supportive services to non-offending family members of trafficked and exploited youth so they are best equipped to support their youth.
- **10.** Travel to participate in appropriate human trafficking trainings, conferences, and stakeholder meetings.
- **11.** Partnering with other counties in the region to share information and develop a regional approach to bring awareness, training, and services.
- **12.** LDSSs may contract with local partner agencies; however, to be successful, LDSSs must remain engaged in ongoing program planning and implementation.

## Non-Permissible Expenses:

Expenses that *cannot* be purchased using Safe Harbour funds include but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Administrative overhead costs, for example, rent/property leasing, standard utility usage, including electric and power costs, janitorial services, etc.
- 2. Staff fringe benefits exceeding 30% unless program staff are LDSS employees.
- 3. Developing a local hotline for CSEC (contact OCFS to learn about existing hotlines to meet this need).
- 4. Public awareness materials and program brochures that have not received prior approval from OCFS.
- 5. Food and refreshments for adults at meetings and trainings (some exceptions may apply; contact OCFS for more details).
- 6. Other expenses are at the discretion of OCFS.

# Counties who receive Safe Harbour: NY funds are committed to meet the following expectations:

 Under the leadership of the LDSSs, counties with Safe Harbour funds will develop or utilize the following:



- An existing critical team to lead the development of a countywide system response to commercially sexually exploited children and trafficked and at-risk youth (Safe Harbour program). It is strongly recommended that programs use the Blueprint to guide the work of the critical team.
- An asset map and needs assessment related to services that can support youth who have experienced CSEC and human trafficking in a survivorcentered, trauma-responsive manner.
- Standardized tools, including those included in <u>15-OCFS-ADM-16</u>, to screen and assess youth for CSEC and human trafficking experiences.
- Referral pathways to ensure trafficked, exploited, and at-risk youth will be provided an appropriate service response.
- Public awareness campaigns and/or outreach initiatives to contact trafficked, exploited, and at-risk youth. (Note: All public awareness materials require OCFS approval before they may be published with OCFS funds.)
- Offer training opportunities to LDSSs and community-based providers on identifying and providing specialized services to youth who have experienced CSEC and human trafficking.
  - OCFS offers Train-the-Trainer opportunities to capacitate local partners to deliver trainings locally.
  - Youth engagement specialists are available at each OCFS regional office to deliver free training on human trafficking to child welfare professionals.
- Partner counties are further committed to the following:
  - Participate in regional Safe Harbour meetings (as applicable).
  - Participate in OCFS's statewide annual conferences.
  - Submit, at OCFS's request, details regarding program spending and claims.
  - Provide a program plan and proposed budged at the beginning of each funding year.
  - Provide a report on its progress at the end of each funding year using the provided template.
  - Respond to OCFS requests for additional information.
- Collect data on all youth identified as commercially sexually exploited, trafficked, or at risk by Safe Harbour: NY-funded agencies in the county, and report this data to OCFS quarterly using the provided template.
  - Data is due to the <u>humantrafficking@ocfs.ny.gov</u> mailbox according to the following schedule:
    - Q1: data from January 1 March 31 (Due 4/22/24)
    - Q2: data from April 1 June 30 (Due 7/22/24)
    - Q3: data from July 1 September 30 (Due 10/21/24)
    - Q4: data from October 1 December 31 (Due 1/20/25)

The New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS), through the Division of Child Care Services (DCCS), is pleased to inform you of the OCFS intention to renew the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for your Local Department of Social Services (LDSS) Day Care Registration and Inspection program. This letter serves to provide you with the funding level for the above calendar year. The MOU documents will provide LDSS with the necessary information to complete the Day Care Registration and Inspection Project electronic application. The documents are included in the email attachments that accompany this funding letter.

The disbursement of funding for your registration contract is described below:

Maximum Funding Available: \$95,615.00

- Please be advised that the signature of an authorized LDSS representative is not required at this point. It will only be required once your agency receives the paper copies of the MOU from your program contract manager after DCCS review and approval of your electronic application.
- No scanned or PDF formats will be accepted.

The registration MOU electronic application includes the <u>Appendix D</u> (application pages), <u>Staff Plan Form</u> (all registration staff <u>must</u> be identified by name and title) and the <u>Draft simplified budget(s)</u>. The <u>Appendix C-1 of Standard Performance Levels and Payment Schedule</u> is attached for your review. Note: Performance standards have been amended for 2024.

DCCS has entered the 2024 dates into the Day Care Registration application and budget(s) pages for you from a copy of the 2023 Appendix D, budget(s), and staff plan which you can modify accordingly with current 2024 information. You may save a copy of the completed documents for your files. Please make all necessary amendments to these forms, which has the most current text, and return for processing. If changes occur after the submission of the Appendix D, please notify the DCCS

contract unit immediately. An e-mail address is being requested on the Appendix D for all contacts, including county administrative staff. (You may use your county email if that is more convenient.)

Please do not amend the budget templates; use those forms provided in the attachments and ensure any subcontractor uses the current template.

The LDSS Districts that utilize a subcontractor to conduct the Day Care Registration and Inspection services will need to include in their electronic application an <u>additional</u>, completed subcontractor budget. Please do not amend the budget templates. The subcontractor's budget, if applicable, needs to be included in the LDSS budget in <u>Section B4</u>. The LDSS (and subcontractor's) B section needs either a <u>quarterly or monthly cost in the line item description</u>, in addition to the description for annual expenses over \$500. The OCFS and Total Cost field amounts need to be filled. LDSS has a ceiling of 5% administration cost when there is a subcontractor.

As a reminder, where applicable, the LDSS, as the contractor, is responsible for the day care registration and inspection project. Therefore, should LDSS utilize a subcontractor to perform the Registration services on their behalf, LDSS is required to include in their subcontractor's agreement:

1. Every standard performance level of the registration MOU found in Appendix C-1.

2. The same rules of confidentiality and professional conduct that are required of all registration staff in the LDSS and the DCCS Regional Offices. It is essential that this language be included.

3. DCCS requests the inclusion of the following statement: It is important to note that during the Day Care Registration and Inspection contract period, training will be conducted and attendance is required, as determined by the OCFS DCCS Regional Office.

It is required to provide to the  $\underline{DCCS}$  Regional Office Manager a  $\underline{signed}$  copy of the subcontractor agreement.

It is the legal responsibility of the contractor, LDSS, to provide supervision and oversight for the Day Care Registration and Inspection Project. DCCS requires for each renewal year, LDSS identify a designee/liaison for the Day Care Registration and Inspection Project. It is a requirement that the LDSS staff person is employed at a professional level. Therefore, it is necessary to provide the DCCS Regional Office with the name of the current LDSS registration staff person responsible for the monitoring of the registration activities as reflected on the Appendix D.

The Appendix C-1 performance standards include the requirement that the contractor maintain identified staffing levels that are necessary to conduct the registration activities and that there be specific, designated staff conducting the registration activities. Therefore, all registration staff must be identified by name and title, as well as their percent of time scheduled for the registration project. Abbreviated names and titles are accepted due to format limitations. We developed a means of electronic transfer of personnel budget information to the Staffing Plan form to better assist in this process. The Staffing Plan form matches the size of the personnel columns in the budget for easy electronic copying of staff names and percentage on the project between these two documents. We added "Paste" buttons for your convenience. Save a copy for your records. You will use this form during the year to report staff changes.

It is a project requirement that the registration staffing plan is submitted as part of the application. <u>The Regional Office Manager will review and approve your registration personnel.</u> Staff resumes must be submitted to the <u>DCCS Regional Office Manager</u> for review and approval.

The staffing levels are also reviewed for approval and updated quarterly on the Summary of Quarterly Registration Review Report by the DCCS Regional Office. <u>It is a quarterly requirement</u>, that after the end of the quarter, any change in registration personnel be reported to the DCCS Regional Office. However, significant registration staff changes should be reported as they occur, <u>anytime</u> during the year, to the Regional Office on this Staffing Plan form. If any staffing requirements are not satisfactorily met, there will be a reduction of the quarterly performance payment as described in the Registration MOU Appendix C-1.

The performance-based claiming process provides equal quarterly payments (1/4 of the total funding, including cents) for the registration and inspection services upon verification of the standard performance levels being met. After the quarter ends, the appropriate DCCS Regional Office Manager will complete a Summary of Quarterly Registration Review Report. The electronically signed quarterly registration report will be sent to LDSS attention. The DCCS Regional Office report will specify that full quarterly payment will be allocated.

If a performance standard is not met, a payment reduction percentage must be applied as established in the Appendix C-1. A copy of the DRAFT Summary of Quarterly Registration Review Report and Overdue Program Report will be provided to the LDSS contractor and, where applicable, the subcontractor. LDSS will have the opportunity to explain how they were not able to meet the standard due to extraordinary or unforeseen circumstances as stated in the Appendix C-1. After receiving such explanation, the DCCS Regional Office report will specify if the reduction is waived and a full quarterly payment will be allocated, or no waiver issued, and payment reduced.

Upon receiving the completed Summary of Quarterly Registration Review Report electronically, <u>LDSS</u> submits an ink signed voucher/claim to the appropriate DCCS Regional Office Manager for the exact amount (including cents) that is in the report. You may create a claim template with standard information for your convenience. However, the claim will need to be printed and ink signed for this Office to process. <u>Please use the Office of the State Comptroller claiming form AC3253-S (2012).</u>

The amount on the claim needs to reflect the <u>exact amount (including cents)</u> shown on the quarterly report or Appendix C-1 (if there is no penalty). <u>There is no rounding to the nearest dollar.</u> Place data inside of the Vendor Box. This ink signed voucher/claim for payment will be scanned by the DCCS Regional Office Manager to the Registration Contract Manager at DCCS Central Office for the processing of the quarterly payment.

Your contribution in this process cannot be overstated. All efforts to submit your completed registration package <u>electronically</u> by <u>December 1</u>, 2023 or earlier will be greatly appreciated. It is essential to take into consideration that the MOU processing time frame <u>may need a two-month minimum</u> from the time that the MOU and budget are reviewed and approved by DCCS, and LDSS returns by mail the authorized signed documents. The sooner your registration renewal package is returned to the DCCS Program Contract Manager and Regional Office Manager, the sooner the review and approval process can begin.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Last year, the Board of Legislators considered and approved a 12-year Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) schedule in connection with the referenced project. After receiving this approval, our client submitted requests to the Brewster Central School District and the Town of Southeast for their approval.

Presentations were made to the School District Board and Town Board.
